OREGON VOTES 2020!



Election Day is Tuesday, November 3, 2020.

Oregon has a safe and reliable Vote by Mail system, and laws that protect your right to vote.

If you registered to vote before **October 13, 2020**, you will automatically receive your ballot in the mail. To check the status of your registration and ballot, visit the Oregon Secretary of State's My Vote webpage at <u>www.oregonvotes.gov/myvote</u>.

Ballots can be returned in any of the following three ways:

- By mail, using the postage-paid envelope provided, if mailed by October 27, 2020.
- At official drop box locations by 8 pm on Election Day, **November 3**. For drop box locations and hours, visit <u>https://sos.oregon.gov/voting/Pages/drop-box-locator.aspx</u>.
- In person, using voting booths or compartments, which each county provides. For more information on how to
 vote in person, contact your county elections office at https://sos.oregon.gov/elections/Pages/countyofficials.aspx.

Oregon also has criminal laws that protect your right to vote. Those laws make it a crime to:

- use or threaten force, violence, or restraint in order to make a person refrain from voting. ORS 260.665.
- obstruct a place designated for ballot drop-off. ORS 260.695(3).
- engage in unlawful paramilitary activity. ORS 166.660.
- remove a ballot from a place designated for ballot drop-off. ORS 260.695(10).

Oregon law also allows members of the public to observe some ballot handling processes, including signature verification and counting. For more information, contact your county elections office.
