As of summer 2024, we are officially beginning to see patients in our Shifa Healing program, designed to compliment our youth violence and crime victim services programming, providing both individual and group therapy as well as other services. As a community based organization, CFSS will hire and train a Restorative Justice Facilitator to coordinate a local RJ program and offer youth centered restorative justice services for schools, the juvenile justice system, youth serving organizations, and other community partners. 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<p>Helping Hands Reentry</p>	<p>Reentry Services</p>	<p>Our initiative aims to address violence through trauma-informed, data-driven, and person-centered strategies. While we offer reentry services to all populations, the funding received from the DOJ will be used specifically for post-correctional individuals, a high rate of which reside in our Yamhill facility. We offer low-barrier emergency shelter and long-term transitional housing across five Oregon counties, supporting individuals experiencing homelessness. Our services include case management, substance abuse programs, life skills training, and educational opportunities. <p>HOLLA</p>	<p>Group violence intervention/focused deterrence</p>	<p>During the last year HOLLA served 77 youth of color through our core focused deterrence programming. This next year we will serve approximately 100 youth. HOLLA implements evidence-based violence prevention strategies with an upstream approach through a culturally specific, community-based, volunteer model that will serve approximately 40 youth of color annually, and a culturally specific school-based model, the Campus Program will serve approximately 60 youth at 4-5 schools in the Reynolds School District. <p>Latino Network</p>	<p>Street outreach and violence interruptions programs</p>	<p>Latino Network's Milpa program is a violence interruption program using a street outreach/credible messenger model that elevates existing assets in our community and provides culturally and linguistically specific mentoring, case management, and resource navigation to youth and their families. Our program connects with youth at risk of becoming perpetrators and/or victims of gun violence through mentoring services while also engaging their families in case management, resource navigation, referrals to treatment, and wraparound support. We have hired an RJ Training Supervisor who offers personalized training and guidance for organizations, groups, and individuals looking to learn about, engage in, or establish new restorative justice diversion programs and conflict management. OP trained staff will serve as a resource where schools and other youth serving agencies turn for effective intervention/prevention services in crisis situations where youth are at risk of becoming involved in gun violence. OP will enhance our established service model, organically expanding our curricula to include direct outreach and engagement with vulnerable youth in the communities, offering them access to social-emotional, behavioral health, peer support, and mentorship. Healing Hurt People is a hospital-based, trauma-informed program supporting victims and their families during traumatic events, within the first 24-hours, helping to reduce cases of retaliatory violence, followed by 18-months of case management with a Life Coach. POIC+RAHS anticipates serving 115 individuals per year. Life Coaches offer critical support through the trauma recovery process, mainly for victims of gun violence. Resolve’s restorative justice practitioners provide community-based services and whole systems restorative justice implementation within k-12 education, young adult corrections and juvenile justice. The evidence indicates that the model is 1) a viable, safe option, 2) results in significant reductions in new arrests and severity, and 3) highlights the importance of the person harmed’s perspective in the treatment process for the responsible party. SOS empowers teenage BIPOC girls at risk of dropping out of school and involvement in violence. The Butterfly Program provides mentorship and guidance to help these young women transform their lives and realize their potential.</p> <p>Inspired by focused deterrence principles, SOS blends accountability with opportunity. <p>The Highland Haven</p>	<p>Street outreach and violence interruptions programs</p>	<p>The Highland Youth Violence Interruption Program is an after-school program focusing on Middle school and High school students from historically underserved communities of color impacted by gun violence and/or at highest risk of being affected by gun violence. We provide robust mentorship with emphasis on violence prevention education, non-violent conflict resolution methods, support healing of the gun violence victims and diverse career pathway training to curb violence and criminal activity. Our staff and mentors are professionals, violence interrupters with credibility in the community, skilled in intervention and supporting youths. Our staff and mentors have lived the experiences of gun violence and have strong relationships with impacted communities. We have strong partnerships with professionals and experts of color in public safety, industry and academia who have also lived the experiences of gun violence enabling us to deliver a credible, culturally specific and community centered program that is positioned to interrupt long standing cycles of community violence and breaks the cycle of retaliatory violence while promoting use of non-violent means to resolve disputes and conflicts, providing healing support services, educational and career path or job training support to keep the youths out of the streets.</p> <p>Total Grant Fund Award: \$300,000.00</p>	<p>Multnomah</p>
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<p>The Insight Alliance</p>	<p>Reentry Services</p>	<p>With an investment from the Oregon DOJ CVI grant, The Insight Alliance can sustain and enhance our wraparound services for individuals releasing from prison and those impacted by the carceral system. We foster mental health, social support, and economic self-sufficiency through classes at three adult and two youth prisons. We provide resource navigation, emergency funding, peer mentorship, and two transitional houses. Insight to Wellbeing forms the basis for our reentry services which begin prior to release. The goals of the program will be to engage participants in services and activities that identify areas of potential conflict and resolve disputes prior to acts of violence.
